

A "My favorite memory was last year for me and when we lost sectionals. We all were sad but everybody ended up cheering each other up."


Q What is the one thing you are really going to miss after basketball is over?

Cancellation Information

Have you ever wondered how and why weather related cancellations happen?

They are a total of 300 square miles in our district. Our buses have a combined 107 stops each way, totaling 214 stops a day. Out of those 214 stops, 146 are on a gravel road, which means about 70% of our bus stops everyday are on gravel. This is usually the reason we have additional snow days compared to other schools. With all of the square miles to cover across our district boundaries, Mrs. Hampton works with many different departments across several towns and counties including, MODOT, Wellington Road District, City of Wellington, Wellington Road District, City of Napoleon, and Odessa and Lexington Road District.

Late Starts

A late start is a 2 hour late start and the buses would be on the roads at 8:40 am, so the road conditions would have to greatly improve from the normal departure time at 6:40 am. Late starts are only effective in situational conditions. Generally a late start is used for temperature purposes or black ice, where sunlight would help with visibility.

Cancellations

During bad weather days, Mrs. Hampton drives a 70 mile route that runs through Wellington and

Napoleon hitting on highways, blacktop and gravel. Sometimes she will drive in the evenings and sometimes in the mornings around 4:30 am. Ideally, she would like to make a decision to cancel by 8 pm the night before. If bad weather comes in overnight, she will drive the roads in the morning and try and make a cancellation by 6 am if possible. When the decision is made to cancel, she will send a Tiger Text out first, then a Facebook post is made. Finally, the news stations are contacted to scroll our school name. From the time a decision is made by her to the time it is published through all of the sources in less than 10 minutes. No news means School is in Session!
