

#### Free or Reduced Breakfast/Lunch

As the District re-opens we are requesting your help in accurately identifying families who may currently be eligible for free/reduced breakfast and lunch benefits. Correctly identifying families aids both the families and the District. As the 2020-21 school year begins the District is requesting that all families complete a free and reduced lunch application as part of the enrollment process. The District serves meals under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program, which includes a free and reduced-price program for those families that are eligible. The program excludes items that are sold on a strictly a la carte basis. Reduced price meals are \$.40 for lunch and \$.25 for breakfast. This program is strictly confidential and there is no distinction between any plated meal for full price, free, or reduced priced meals.

f your family meets the financial guidelines set by the state, your child may be eligible to receive free or reduced breakfast and lunches. The quidelines are based on family income and the total number of people living in your household (family members or not).

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# Message From Our Superintendent

Reflecting back on the past school year provides many opportunities to celebrate! From individual student mile-stones, to our district earning 100% on our Annual Performance Report (APR) through the state, to our community showing their support in passing the Bond Issue with 83% approval, I continue to glow with pride from the progress and growth our district continues to make. I often have the opportunity to brag among fellow superintendents about how supportive this community is, how involved our parents and patrons are, how knowledgeable our school board is, how dedicated of our staff members are, and how well our students behave and conduct themselves.

With the passing of the April Bond Issue, we have many projects in progress. This summer has been spent with engineers, surveyors, and design teams to outline the scope and sequence of the work. Our lighting project just went out to bid and installation will start in September during evening hours. This project will update all interior and exterior lighting to LED, which will provide some energy savings and rebates. The engineering team is still working to find the solution to our drainage issue that causes flooding into lower locker rooms, the back parking lot, and classrooms. We plan to bid out parking lots this fall once we have an outlined plan on how to repair the drainage issue. Over Christmas break we plan to conduct some asbestos abatement for floor tiles in the main hallway and two classroom, as well as laying new flooring throughout those areas. Finally, next spring and summer we will replace roofing, HVAC units, and complete the building project for an additional locker room. We will also enclose the weight room. None of these needed projects would be possible without the support of our community.

The W-N School Board has held multiple, in-depth conversations about the need to run a Tax Levy Increase in 2020. This has been a discussion for many years, in predicting the future fund balances, expenditures, and revenues. Our district has not asked patrons to vote for a levy increase since 1992. The Board of Education is very proud that our current tax levy is the lowest compared to surrounding schools. We also have the longest standing levy; all other schools have increased their levy since we last increased ours. However, we don't want to lower our educational standards or the quality of education we provide our students due to financial restrictions. Our student population is not growing, which could bring in additional funding, and the commercial property taxes are not increasing. The only way for us to gain additional revenue is with the support of a local tax levy increase. We will continue to monitor the financial situation closely and make cuts in our current budget where necessary before determining any specifics of a tax levy increase.



## **Virtual Courses Guidelines**

Because virtual instruction can be an effective education option for some students, the district may offer virtual courses to students through district staff or by contracting for those services as part of the district-sponsored curriculum. In addition, eligible students may enroll in virtual courses offered through the Missouri Course Access Program (MOCAP). The district will accept all grades and credits earned through district-sponsored virtual instruction and MOCAP. The district will pay the costs of a virtual course only if the district has first approved the student's enrollment in the course as described in this policy. The virtual course has to be approved by the district to ensure consistency with the student's academic credits, growth and personal/post-secondary goals. The district is not required to provide students access or pay for courses beyond the equivalent of full-time enrollment. Students taking courses virtually are subject to district policies, procedures, and rules applicable to students enrolled in traditional courses including, but not limited to, the district's discipline code and prohibitions on academic dishonesty, discrimination, harassment, bullying, and cyberbullying. The following guidelines will apply for enrolling students into a virtual course through MOCAP:

- Open enrollment periods and registration deadlines will be provided to students thirty days prior to the close of those deadlines.
- Students enrolled in a district-sponsored virtual course through MOCAP are expected to actively participate in the course with the
- The district may remove a student from a course due to inactivity or non-completion of the course, and may refuse to enroll the student in future virtual courses.
- Students enrolled in a district-sponsored course through MOCAP will be considered in attendance for state aid purposes in accordance with law. A completed virtual course shall be counted as no less than 95% attendance for purposes of A+ eligibility.
- Students are required to take state-required EOC examinations administered by the district regardless of whether the course for which the examination is required was taken virtually or in the traditional classroom.
- Enrollment in a district-sponsored course through MOCAP will be determined by the following eligibility requirements:
- The student resides in the district.
- The student was in attendance in the district the semester immediately prior to enrolling in a MOCAP course.
- A student will be excused from this requirement based on administrative discretion due to, but not limited to, the following: if he or she has a documented medical or psychological diagnosis or condition that prevented the student from attending a school in the
- The enrollment is approved by the principal or designee.
- Enrollment in a district-sponsored MOCAP course does not cause the students to exceed full-time enrollment in the district.
- The district will schedule the MOCAP courses at the beginning or end of the school day. The district will also take into consideration the individual needs of the students when determining the schedule of MOCAP courses and will be based on administrative
- Transportation will only be provided by the district before and after the normal school day (before 8:00 am and after 3:15pm).
- Students who are enrolled in district-sponsored MOCAP courses are not required to be on campus during the hours of their scheduled virtual courses. They are required to be in attendance for the traditional scheduled classes and the district will follow the current attendance and tardy policies for these traditional classes.
- Students who are enrolled in district-sponsored MOCAP courses and who are not in attendance at school for a full class schedule will be responsible for their transportation to and from school
- The district will not pay for any virtual courses that a student or parent/guardian requests to take that are offered at the school during the traditional school day.
- The District does not provide Internet access for courses taken off campus.
- The District will provide connectivity and technical support while the student is on campus.
- District counselors will develop an individual career and academic plan (ICAP) for students enrolled in three or more virtual courses.

- All of the above policies apply to summer school remediation courses with the exception of on campus attendance.
- Students taking summer school remediation courses through MOCAP are required to be in attendance on campus during summer school hours of operation.
